



### **About the Resource...**

Elementary and secondary school teachers will discover a rich library of resources about Black Canadians and their contributions to our society both past and present. Teachers from all disciplines and grade levels will find useful information and materials to support and enrich their programs by including Black Canadians' voice and perspectives.

The listings are organized into four main categories: Events, People, Resources, and Classroom Support. Within each of these categories, there is a variety of types of resources – print, electronic media, people, and community links. Teachers are encouraged to use these materials as reference and in building upon their personal bank of resources.

While there is an indication of the level for which the resources might be most supportive, e.g., for use with elementary or secondary students, teachers should review the listings to select those materials that are most appropriate for enhancing their students' learning and that work well with their programs.

The regional resources are a starting point for teachers to explore ways they can make connections with their local community to arrange relevant learning experiences for their students.

The listings were carefully selected for authenticity, balance in perspective, and accessibility. Teachers are encouraged to preview both the electronic and print resources and to consider the background, experiences, and needs of their students when selecting the resources. They should consult their school/board policy with regard to access and use of electronic media and respect for copyright.
